Students of Robb College UNE, assisted by students from other UNE colleges and Armidale schools, completed the World's Largest Painting and received a Guinness Book of Records Certificate certifying that "The Largest Painting Measured 102.93 x 65.38 metres and was painted by students at Robb College at Armidale, NSW, Australia in May 1990", signed by Donald McFarlan and Morris McWhirter. It was included in the *Guinness Book of Records* 1991 to 1994.

Amanda Bishop, Projects Officer for the Robb College Junior Common Room,

initiated the Project. The painting was completed with the support of students from Robb, other UNE colleges and high school students in Armidale. It was under the overall guidance of UNICEF Australia's Goodwill Ambassador and Sydney Artist, Mr Ken Done.

The photo captures Bill Andreas (1990 JCR Vice-President and Painting Coordinator), Ken Done and Amanda Bishop (1990 JCR Projects Officer) when working on the final seven paintings.



Dr Jim Irvine, Master of Robb College from January 1981 to December 1990, described the Project:

When completed, the World's Largest Painting was a patchwork of 2,747 individually painted $1.5m \times 1.5m$ calico squares, covering a surface area of $6,727m^{2}$; and measuring 102.93m by 65.38m, with a superimposed giant 'smiley' face and black border, a title, and stylised Robb and UNICEF crests in the bottom corners.

All the rolls of painted calico were laid out and sewn together on the Sports Union's Consett Davis AFL field. School and university students had been supplied with



brushes and access to cans of brightly coloured, water-based Wattyl house paints. Painting of individual squares began in March and continued every day into early May. Every artist created one or more depictions of "Children and Childhood" onto these calico squares. The squares were then sewn together. John Meredith, son of Ben Meredith, the first Robb College Master, in a non-stop marathon effort over six days and nights, completed the sewing with a small, dedicated band of helpers.

Ken Done flew to Armidale, on May 10th, 1980, painted and signed the final seven squares along the bottom row. The painting was photographed from the air by a professional photographer sitting in a small fixed-wing open aeroplane, to meet the standards required by the Guinness Book. The giant painting was formally measured by local Rotarians to verify its authenticity and dimensions.

In October 1990, a cheque for the \$17,500 dollars raised was handed to Film Actress and International UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, Audrey Hepburn in Sydney by Jim Irvine, Amanda Bishop and Bill Andreas. The donation supported UNICEF Australia's Robert Nestdale Memorial Appeal for work in Malawi. Robert Nestdale was a former UNE student.



The painting was depicted on one of UNICEF's 1990 Christmas card and five of the seven framed Ken Done paintings were awarded to sponsors, organisers and to Robb College, with the remaining two auctioned and raffled at the 1990 Robb College Art Exhibition.
