Head of College Report Jamie Moore

Greetings and Salutations Robbers far and wide

Well, what a year it has been!

The term "Operational Resilience" has been used with the consistency of "Hello" and forced us all to look at what Business as Usual really means.

The College started the year at close to capacity and was a vibrant and exciting place. With an amazing leadership team in place and what promised to be a fantastic new cohort we were humming along. Unfortunately, that only lasted for around 5 weeks before everyone was advised that the college would be closing and students encouraged to go home or reside in the 2 colleges earmarked to handle the remaining students.

Through this time the college worked hard to remain connected through forms of social media, zoom and the students adjusted, admirably, to the world of online learning. Most continuing students had experienced some forms of "online" through their degree but for our first-year students this posed a bigger problem. Suddenly being thrust from a college life back into home life, for some, meant they were then juggling work commitments with UNE work. However, through the use of different strategies of reducing study loads, deferring completely or just honing skills of time management students were able to put together a set of results that wasn't a reflection of the challenges they faced.

Our post-COVID return saw a reduced capacity and the college welcomed back around 80 students. With no social events, reduced capacities in common spaces and eating out of takeaway containers it was only the most stoic that remained. To the students' credit they were able to maintain a vibrant and well-connected community and, it is thanks to them, we will start 2021 in a position of strong recovery. Our sporting teams were decimated with the Rugby Club only able to field two teams, thanks to the long-distance support of some ex-Robbers and Friends of the college. Our netballers were able to put together four teams and had an extremely successful year with three titles and a runners up flag. Again, a credit, not only to our residents but our strong affiliate cohort also. Unfortunately, COVID put the brakes on our fundraising efforts. Kate Cleaver had the beginnings of a wonderful new idea, a naked cookbook, to offset the years of calendars but alas was unable to finish. Hopefully we can pick up where she left off in 2021.

Along with the disruption to college life, circumstances forced the cancellation of our 60year celebrations. This was a real shame as it was to be a centerpiece of the Foundation's drive to the finish line for its scholarship fundraising. We will have a look at 2021 and see if there is an opportunity to bring the Robb community together and recognize the rich

fellowship that continues to be a hallmark of the Robb culture. As is the case with most of society all will be dictated by public health orders and government restrictions.

Even though it was a disrupted year for the students the Robb Machine continued to roll on and can I thank all those who remained concerned and connected to both the college and the students. From coaching to employment, from phone calls to Facebook the SCR remained an important part of the college experience. To Geoff Perry and the Foundation, they were able to launch the new scholarship pathway, initiate an industry based copartnered scholarship (which included securing support for UNE research) and helped me to keep an eye on the future. Jack and the Alumni committee were hamstrung but at our AGM were able to gain some new committee members and look to further engage our most recent Alumni.

It was a very tough second half of the year for UNE with the initiation of a workforce change management process that saw them embark on wiping 20 million dollars from the payroll budget. This proved a stressful time for a lot of people but eventually, through two rounds of voluntary redundancies, almost 200 staff members moved on. This has flow on effects for all areas and residential saw their staff numbers drop by half including two Heads of College that will not be replaced. This has caused a major rethink on how we are to continue to offer an appropriate student experience on-campus and we will continue to work through options and scenarios until we find a model that works best.

The University has chosen to undertake a staged return to campus model which will see a continuation of largely online lectures and workload however there are negotiations currently underway to provide greater opportunities for face-to-face pracs for those subjects that need it.

Some good news, however is that we will be able to start 2021 aiming for capacity. I appreciate that there will be quite a few waiting to see how 2021 is shaping up but it is my expectation is that we will be pushing that figure.

I am looking forward to, hopefully, a more normal looking 2021 and can't wait to welcome the students back. I take this opportunity to wish you all a Merry Christmas, a COVID-safe festive period and a "normal" 2021.

We were delighted we were able to launch our new pathway and extend our scholarships to these young Robbers during this difficult year. They have all expressed their sincere thanks to the Foundation and our Donors for supporting them whether they were in College or studying from home. The funds assisted them during the disruption to set up equipment at home and this year they had to complete their exams online.

A big thank you to the 60 Robb Alumni and SCR members who have contributed to achieve this result. We now must try to maintain some momentum during this difficult time to raise the 2nd leg by end of 2022.

Progress of Appeal Currently we have over \$650,000 in scholarship funds and we are hopeful we can reach at least \$800,000 by end of 2021. We have lowered our target a bit due to having to cancel our plans this year for dinners, reunions and events such as the Rural Focus Symposium. If we can reach this target we can launch two new scholarships, to have two scholarships for each year in College commencing 2022.

Appeal to employers for Co-operative funding and work experience In August the Board moved to invite employers to joint fund our scholarships to help accelerate the number we can offer plus provide a program of work experience. We were delighted that Octopus Investments, one of the largest renewable energy companies in the world, has joined with us as our inaugural donor-partner to commence this program in 2021. Details can be found on our website and we are seeking more employers to join us.

Call to fund new IRVINE Scholarship in tribute to the 3rd Master of College

Dr Jim and Sue Irvine headed Robb for 10 years in the 80's. They implemented big, brave initiatives with the students which helped to keep the College full for years and established many traditions that are still continued today. Both Jim and Sue are Life Members of just




